This type of investment in local people and local industry is at the heart of what WCCC does to lift up individuals and build the economy downeast.

WCCC has ratified impressive compressive transfer agreements with both the University of Maine at Machias and Husson University allowing WCCC graduates to transfer seamlessly to those two institutions taking all of the credits earned here with them.

Beyond academics, WCCC also moved to become a tobacco free campus this year. While this was a challenging switch for some in our community, we supported our students and personnel, and we all made the adjustment quite well. I am proud to say that a number of individuals on campus have been able to kick the habit this year!

Alexander Clifford Has Made A Difference



Although he has only been on the job for about five months, Deer Isle native Alexander Clifford has made a difference as the new dean of Academic Affairs at Washington County Community College.

"Dean Clifford's area of expertise in both the academic and military worlds has taken the office in new directions," WCCC President Joe Cassidy said. "He has forged a wonderful relationship with students and has been a steady support for faculty and staff. He is well respected by all."

Clifford, who has a notable background in education, is currently finishing up his Doctor of Philosophy degree in Management Specialization of Leadership and Organizational Change from Walden University in Minnesota. He expects to be awarded his degree this year. He has a Master of Business Administration from

Thomas College in Waterville and a Bachelor of Science degree in Professional Business Studies from the same college.

Most recently he was professor of business/grant administrator and curriculum designer at Kennebec Valley Community College in Fairfield.

In 1989 he joined the Maine Army National Guard and is currently a Sergeant Major (E-9).

When he arrived on campus in December, Clifford said that he wanted to be a member of the staff at WCCC because he had been impressed with the College's interest in its students. "It is that interest in our student body that has made him such a strong and compassionate leader," Cassidy added. "We are so lucky to have him."

In addition to an impressive portfolio of academic and professional awards, Clifford was awarded the bronze star for leadership and management in a combat zone; the meritorious service medal for leadership, management, mentoring and accreditation performance in the academy environment and awarded several army commendation medals for leadership and management.

The New Mental Health Rehabilitation Technician/Community Program

In its efforts to meet the needs of a changing workforce, Washington County Community College has unveiled a new program this year that will lead to jobs in the mental health community.

The new Mental Health Rehabilitation Technician/Community program will allow students who successfully complete the course to do MaineCare billing for some

mental health services.

The two-year program will lead to an Associate of Arts Degree and is being taught by a full-time instructor with the help of adjunct staff.

Once completed, the students will be able to provide Community Integration (Adult Mental Health Case Management), Intensive Case Management, Assertive Community Treatment, Skills

Development and Family Psycho-Education for mental health consumers. These positions are outlined in the MaineCare Benefits Manual.

"These are the kinds of exciting new programs being offered here at Washington County Community College," WCCC President Joe Cassidy said. "Our instructors and staff continue to look to the needs of the state and our region and build

programs around those needs. When our students graduate from WCCC, there is an excellent chance that a job will be waiting for them."

Although new to WCCC, the program is also being taught at Kennebec Valley Community College (KVCC), Central Maine Community College (CMCC), Southern Maine Community College (SMCC) and York County Community College (YCCC).

The All-Maine Academic Team is a program of Phi Theta Kappa, an international honor society for two year colleges. Students are nominated and selected for the team by their college based on outstanding academic achievement, leadership, and service.

The Bridge Program Offers Opportunities

Education has to be dynamic to meet the needs of a changing world and Washington County Community College is in the vanguard when it comes to meeting the challenges of change.

Students enrolled at WCCC have the opportunity to participate in what is known as the Bridge Program, which offers them an opportunity to immerse themselves in summer English and Mathematics programs to upgrade or refresh their skills prior to starting their traditional degree program.

"Students who are enrolled in their first year of classes this coming fall are eligible to take our summer Bridge Program if

they need help with math or English and meet other eligibility criteria," WCCC Academic Dean Alex Clifford said.

The coursework is part of the college's Liberal Studies program and is designed to help students in every discipline meet their general education requirements. "Most of our degree concentration programs require a lot of math and English within the courses, so it is beneficial all the way around," Clifford added.

What makes this program important is the wide range of students who benefit from it. "This is a program to augment the student experience and our initial data from our first year of

the program, which started last year, indicates that students who participated in the summer Bridge Program are performing better than those with similar testing scores who did not participate," Clifford said.

What makes this program important is the wide range of students who benefit from it.

With the support of the Maine Community Foundation, WCCC will be awarding up to five scholarships to students who participate in the Bridge Program this summer. Each scholarship will be awarded for up to three years of study and up to a total of \$11,500.00.

WCCC Partners with St. Croix Tissue

The coursework is intense, but the potential rewards are limitless as 38 Washington County Community College students finish their coursework and prepare to interview for the 80 new positions that soon will be available at St. Croix Tissue later this year.

The Baileyville company soon will have a new state-of-the-art tissue machine installed at its facilities and once installed it is looking to expand its workforce.

Last year, WCCC partnered with the county's major employer through a grant from the MCCS Maine Quality Center program to provide seven courses over seven months in everything from pulp and papermaking, provided in partnership with Kennebec Valley Community

College, to mathematics, communications, chemistry, computer skills and safety. The MCCS Maine Quality Center is providing the training at no cost to the students.

At the start of the program, 40 students enrolled in the training; today 38 continue to meet the challenge.

"This has been an extremely successful program," WCCC Dean Alexander Clifford said. "The students are highly talented, extremely engaged, and the faculty has nothing but praise for their efforts. This is a highly motivated group of students who are looking at this training as an opportunity to positively change the trajectory of their lives through a career at St. Croix Tissue."

Although completion of the training program only guarantees an interview with the mill, Clifford said that he was confident that given the performance of the students thus far he anticipated that a significant number of them would be hired.

Clifford said that this may be just the beginning for the college-mill cooperative. He said WCCC's administrative staff was presently in talks with the company about future employee training needs. "We may run another program similar to this," the Dean of Academic Affairs said, "But there is a larger need for Washington County in general."

As a result, the college is in the initial phase of designing a

Production Technician Degree pathway that would provide students with an educational opportunity that prepares them for supervisory and management level responsibilities in facilities like St. Croix Tissue.

"The best part of this degree is that it will also lead to a manufacturing industry certification. This industry credential also has a green production component to help us understand the sustainable use of resources and disposal of industrial wastes that are generated in many processes. This degree will be the only one in Maine, possibly the Northeast," he said.

14th Annual Golf Tournament

Tournament co-sponsor Ian Pratt of Pratt Chevrolet- Olds-Buick-Pontiac-Geo on the River Road in Calais is the sponsor of that prize. Pratt also plans to donate other prizes for the tournament.

What makes this scholarship program so unique is the role that the individual or business that donates plays in the life of the student, as each scholarship created

goes directly to the student. As in the past, donors are able to create a scholarship in their name or their businesses' name, or in memory of a loved one. Or, the scholarship can be anonymous. Donors choose the program of study they wish to support and create the scholarship criteria. A \$250 or more donation is presented to the deserving student at the end of the year. It is all tax deductible to the donor.

"Although the tournament is an exciting event each year, this is really about helping Washington County students," WCCC President Joe Cassidy said. "We have seen year after year that a single donation can mean the difference for helping a student stay in school."

It is no surprise that businesses step forward each year to help because the College is a vital part of the community. In recent years, WCCC was named one of the Top 10 percent community colleges in the USA by the Aspen Institute and the 46th Best Community College in the USA by the Best Schools.org. In addition the College was named in the Top 25 Best Community Colleges in the USA by the Washington Monthly.
